Corporal. Corporal Angore, Co. E
108th Inf. was killed in action
in Northern France, early in
the morning of Sep. 29/18 in the
battle of Le. Catelot. He was the
first man from this town to
be buried in the soil of France,
the third man from this town
to give his life for his country.
He entered the U.S. Army, Mar.
1916 at Jamestown and became
a member of Co. E 74th National Guard. He went with
that organization to the Mexican border. Upon return
of the 74th and following the entrance of the U.S. in
the World War, he did guard duty for a time
on the Lake Shore R.R. leaving Sept. 29, 1917 for
Camp Wadsworth, Spartanburg, S.C. The 74th there
became the new 108th a part of the 27th Div.

May 8, 1918 his marriage to Miss Edith Jackson
of Jamestown, N.C. took place at Newport News, Va. He
sailed for France May 19, 1918.

For a time he was stationed in Flanders but
about the middle of Sept. left for Le. Catelot in
Northern France, where his division was
associated with British troops.

As the result of being selected as one of a
body of storm troops it became his lot to go over the
top. The order was bravely carried out but at a great
(over)

cast.

One of Corporal Angore's friends thus wrote to his wife: "I myself assisted at the burial of Corp. Angore. He was found with a smile on his face, having been instantly killed by a shot in the temple."

Corporal Angore was the son of Mrs Mrs Wm. Angore of Cullaraugus, N.Y.
