The reports from Richmond brought in by the sick and wounded who are constantly arriving are truly horrible it is impossible for the mind to imagine any thing so terrible

but what its reality can be found in the swamps and on the hills around Richmond but in defiance of all dangers and disadvantages and despite the superhuman efforts of desperate madmen the nobel army of the Potomac is gallantly sustain ing itself and ? ? which will never fade as long as freedom is loved and cherished by the hun ?.
